# Welcome Back TO OUR Branches

As a precautionary measure in response to COVID-19, beginning in March, South Jersey Federal Credit Union closed some branches and offered limited hours in others. We are happy to announce that as of July 13, all of our branches are open during regular banking hours for basic teller transactions. As you can see from these photographs, we've instituted safety measures, including plexiglass barriers, face masks for all employees and members, and social distancing requirements.

Although SJFCU was always available to members with mobile banking, telephone banking, our locally staffed call center, and website chat feature, we were excited to greet members face-to-face again. You may not be able to tell, but trust us when we tell you that our SJFCU team members are smiling beneath those masks!

According to EducationData.org, over the past three decades, the cost to attend college has increased almost 8 times faster than wages, leaving families wondering how they will fund a college education without incurring a crippling amount of debt. Whether you have an elementary school student or a high school junior who has begun the college search process, understanding the options for paying college expenses can help you develop a realistic plan for your child's educational goals and your financial goals. Potential sources of financial aid include:

FEDERAL GRANTS - Pell Grants, Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants (FSEOG), Teacher Education Assistance for College and Higher Education (TEACH) Grants, and Iraq and Afghanistan Service Grants are usually based on financial need and do not have to be repaid.

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) becomes available on October 1 each year. Complete and submit it, even if you don't think you'll qualify for federal aid. Some colleges use the FAFSA to determine eligibility for their own grants and scholarships.

SCHOLARSHIPS - Many nonprofit and private organizations offer scholarships based on academic merit, talent, a particular area of study, or financial need. For instance, SJFCU awarded \$6,300 in scholarships to individual students and additionally contributed another \$7,000 to area high schools for scholarships. The U.S. Department of Labor offers a free scholarship search tool at CareerOneStop.org.

WORK-STUDY - The federal work-study program provides part-time jobs for college students to earn money to help pay educational expenses.

STUDENT LOANS - Student loans can come from the federal government, from private sources such as a bank or financial institution, or from other organizations. Loans offered by the Federal Government – Direct Subsidized Loans, which are based on need, and Direct Unsubsidized Loans, which are not based on need – offer a fixed interest rate which is usually lower than that of private loans.

**SJFCU Tuition Rewards Program** 

SJFCU's Tuition Rewards Program is an easy way to start earning funds for college. When you enroll in the program, you'll earn points totaling five percent of your deposit account balances each year. Those points can be used to offset tuition through guaranteed scholarships at over 400 participating private colleges. You can designate a child, grandchild, or other family member to receive your points. The earlier you join, the more you can save. # PRODUCT SPOTLIGHT: CREDIT BUILDER LOANS

Whether you're interested in establishing credit or seeking to rebuild a better credit history, a credit builder loan may help. We've broken down the basics of this loan product to help you determine whether a credit builder loan is a worthwhile option for you:

# **BUILD CREDIT WHILE SAVING**

If you're approved for a credit builder loan, SJFCU will loan you an amount between \$500 and \$2,500. There is a \$35 application fee, and proof of income or a cosigner with proof of income is required. Unlike other loans, which result in the borrower receiving the money right away, SJFCU deposits your funds into a special interest-bearing savings account.

You make monthly payments until the loan is paid with a low interest rate that is established during the application process. When the loan is paid in full -6 to 24 months after the start of the loan - you have access to all the money in the special savings account, and SJFCU provides a good report to the credit bureaus.

# **CREDIT BUILDER LOAN BENEFITS:**

- Members who have never borrowed can establish a credit score
- Members with lower credit scores can improve their repayment history
- Members who participate have the chance to increase their savings balances
- The cost of the loan interest is partially offset by the interest your savings account earns



A member commended Martha Baksh on April 9.





# **Holiday Food Hacks**

From carving jack-o'-lanterns to carving Thanksgiving turkeys, we prepare a number of special foods throughout the fall and winter. If you're tempted to throw out the flesh of a pumpkin or if you can't bring yourself to eat another turkey sandwich, these recipes will give new life to your holiday leftovers – and help you save money.

# HALLOWEEN: HOMEMADE PUMPKIN SPICE LATTE

### **INGREDIENTS**

2 tablespoons pumpkin purée (after removing the seeds, blend pumpkin flesh in a food processor or blender until smooth)

1/2 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice, plus more for garnish

- 1 dash of freshly ground black pepper
- 2 tablespoons granulated sugar
- 2 tablespoons vanilla extract
- 2 cups whole milk
- 1/4 cup espresso or 1/3 to cup strong coffee
- 1/4 cup cold heavy cream, whipped into firm peaks

#### **DIRECTIONS**

- 1. Place the pumpkin purée, pumpkin pie spice, and a dash of black pepper in a small saucepan over medium heat and cook, stirring constantly, until hot, about 2 minutes.
- 2. Add the sugar and stir until the mixture becomes a bubbly syrup.
- 3. Whisk in the milk and vanilla and warm gently, stirring often and watching carefully to make sure it doesn't boil over.
- 4. Blend the mixture with a hand blender or in a traditional blender (hold the lid down tightly with a towel) until frothy.
- 5. Divide the espresso or coffee between 2 mugs. Add the frothed pumpkin and milk mixture.
- 6. Top with whipped cream and a sprinkle of pumpkin pie spice, cinnamon or nutmeg.



# PRUDENT PUMPKIN PURCHASES

Buy your pumpkins at a roadside stand, rather than a supermarket. Also, avoid carving your jack-o'-lantern too early to avoid having to buy another before Halloween.



# THANKSGIVING: TURKEY CHILI

### **INGREDIENTS**

- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 medium onion, diced
- 1 green bell pepper, diced
- 1 small jalapeno, seeded and minced
- 2 cloves garlic, chopped
- 1/4 cup chili powder
- 1 tablespoon ground cumin
- 1 tablespoon dried oregano

Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

- 3 to 4 cups leftover roasted turkey, chopped or pulled into 3/4-inch pieces
- 1 28-ounce can fire-roasted diced tomatoes
- 2 cups low-sodium chicken broth
- 2 15-ounce cans pinto beans

Leftover mashed potatoes or cooked rice, for serving Sour cream and chopped scallion, for serving

### **DIRECTIONS**

- Heat the oil in a large pot or Dutch oven over medium heat. Add the onion and bell pepper and cook, stirring occasionally, until the vegetables are soft, about 6 minutes. Stir in the jalapeno and garlic and cook until they soften slightly, about 1 minute.
- 2. Stir in the chili powder, oregano, 1/2 teaspoon salt and a few grinds of pepper. Add the turkey and stir until well coated in the spices.
- 3. Pour in the tomatoes and chicken broth and stir well, scraping pan.
- 4. Bring the mixture to a simmer on medium-low and cook, uncovered, until the liquid has reduced a few inches and the chili has thickened, about 1 hour.
- 5. Drain and rinse one can of the beans; leave the bean liquid in the second can. Add the beans and reserved bean liquid to the pot and heat until warmed through, about 10 minutes.
- Season to taste with salt and pepper, and serve over potatoes or rice with a dollop of sour cream and sprinkle of chopped scallions.
